A Lot Done – A Lot More To Do

The year for vocation to the diocesan priesthood has been very busy. Commencing in April with the **Evangelisation and Vocation Conference** with **Archbishop Reno Fisichella** from the Dicastery for Evangelisation which had a packed-out attendance in the Renehan Hall. This conference received considerable coverage and reporting in both print and on-line media platforms.

This was followed by the Mass for Vocations Sunday which was broadcast on RTE One Television. RTE News also produced a four-minute video news report which was aired on the News At 9 on RTE and on the RTE News App.

In November, we hosted in collaboration with the seminary in Maynooth a “**Come and See**” discernment weekend, which had an attendance of 36 men.

In August, we were approached by **Scratch Media** who were contacted by RTE to produce a documentary on “**The Last Priest in Ireland**”. They were aware of our special “**Year for Vocation to Diocesan Priesthood**”. We proposed that they record an event in Knock which would see a gathering of representatives from every diocese at a prayer service for vocations and the blessing of a specially commissioned Vocations Cross.



Fr. Willie Purcell was also interviewed by Ardal O’Hanlon along with Fr. Vincent Stapleton. The documentary and the follow-up panel discussion on the “**Upfront with Katie Hannon**” generated a significant awareness and conversation across the country about priesthood, vocations and the future for the church. One thing that is more apparent, is the general view that priests are valued and appreciated by the wider community.

At our recent meeting of Diocesan Vocation directors in Maynooth in January, a considerable number of the vocation directors present reported that they have seen an increase in the number of enquiries about priesthood compared to previous years.

So, a lot has been done, but there is a lot more to do. On the following pages you will learn of some of the event and activities planned from now up to the end of the “year” on Vocations Sunday, April 21, 2024

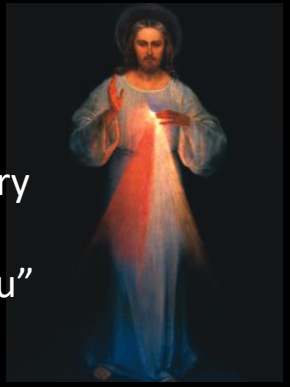


Divine Mercy Conference

Adoration for Vocations



It is proposed that on the weekend of the 4th Sunday of Easter (Good Shepherd Sunday) that there will be an outpouring of prayer for Vocations before the Blessed Sacrament

40 Hours Adoration for Vocations

Some parishes are opting for a 40 hours for vocations, spreading the 40 hours over three days, for example two days of 15 hours (6 am to 9 pm) and one day of 10 hours 12 noon to 10 pm.

Holy Hour for Vocations

Other diocese are planning to have a holy hour either before their vigil mass for Vocation Sunday, on Saturday 20th April or after their last mass on Vocations on Sunday 21st April.

RTE Religious

The “Year for Vocations to the Diocesan Priesthood” will conclude on Vocations Sunday (21st April) which will mark the 61st World Day of Prayer for Vocations. The mass will be broadcast on RTE One Television.

Year for Vocation to the Diocesan Priesthood

First Sunday of Lent – 18th February 2024

We pray for vocations and for those who are being called to discern a vocation to the priesthood, the diaconate or religious life. Today's Psalm says *"Lord, make me know your ways ... teach me your paths ... make me walk in your truth... for you are God my saviour"*. We pray that the Holy Spirit will lead and guide those who are being called to discover their vocation.

Second Sunday of Lent – 25th February -2024

In our first reading we read that *"God put Abraham to the test"*. Abraham responds with complete trust *"Here I am"*. We pray for those discerning a vocation that they may have the grace and strength to trust in God and respond like Abraham – "Here I am".

Third Sunday of Lent – 3rd March 2024

To proclaim your faith and belief in God in today's society is counter cultural. So too in St Paul's day – proclaiming belief in Jesus who was crucified was an obstacle to the Jews and madness to the Greeks. We pray that those who the Lord calls to follow Him as a priest, deacon or religious, to proclaim the Gospel will have the courage to place their trust in God.

Fourth Sunday of Lent 10th March 2024

In our Gospel St. John tells us that *God sent His Son so that the world might be saved through Him* and Jesus is the light in the darkness of the world. We pray for those who the Lord calls to bring the light of faith to those in darkness, that they will respond to the call of Jesus to follow as a priest, deacon or religious.

Fifth Sunday of Lent – 17th March 2024 - Solemnity - St. Patrick

In today's Gospel some Greeks came *"to see Jesus"*. In reply Jesus tells them that *"unless a wheat grain falls to the ground and dies, it remains a single grain; but if it dies it yields a rich harvest"*. We pray for those who are called to follow the Lord as a priest, deacon or religious, that like St. Patrick, they may "Take the Risk for Christ" and give of their lives and follow in the Way of Jesus.

Passion Sunday – 24th March 2024

In our first reading, Isaiah tells us *"Each morning he wakes me to hear, to listen as a disciple"* – we pray that those whom the Lord calls to follow His as a priest, deacon or religious, may hear the gentle whisper of God's call amid the noise of this life.
